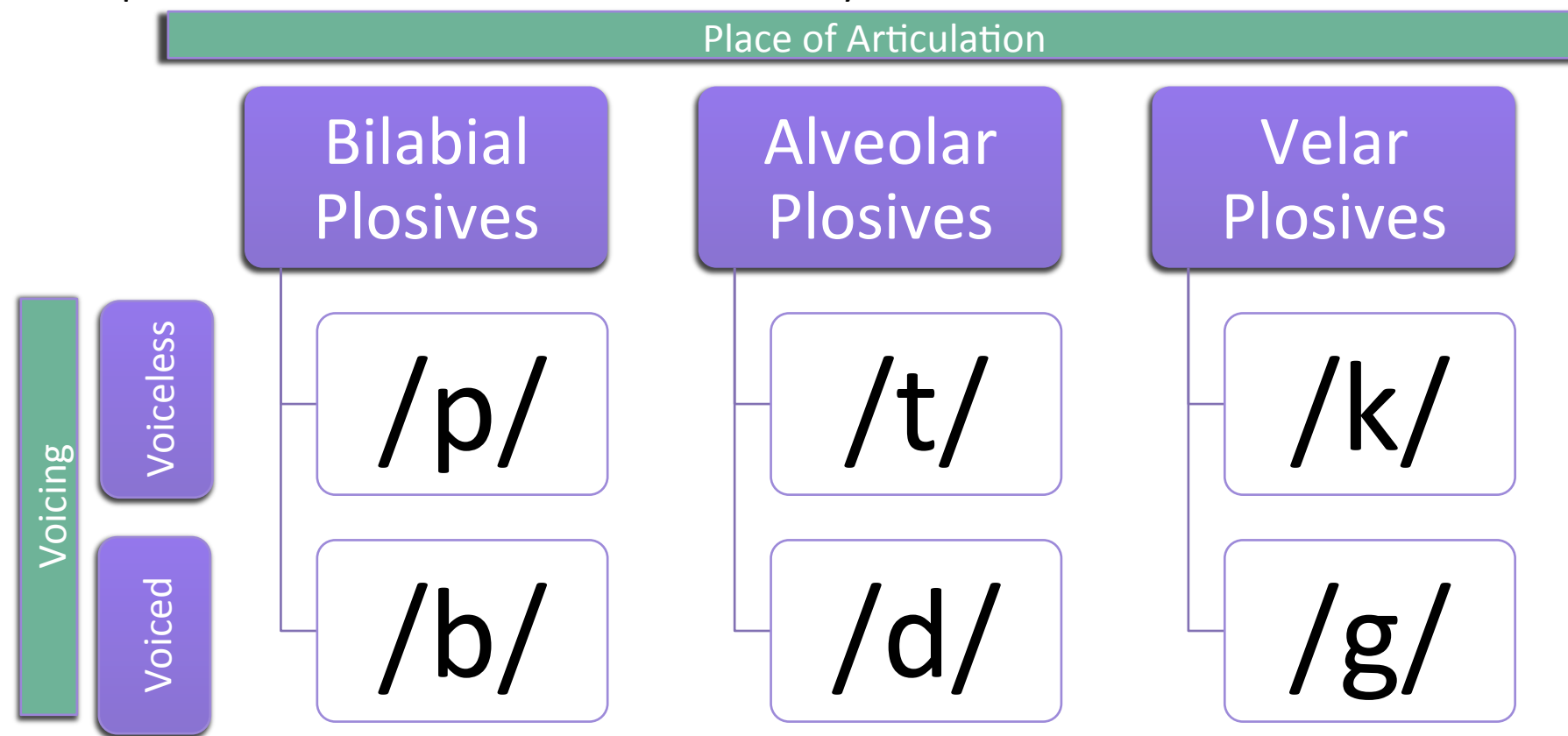


Place of Articulators



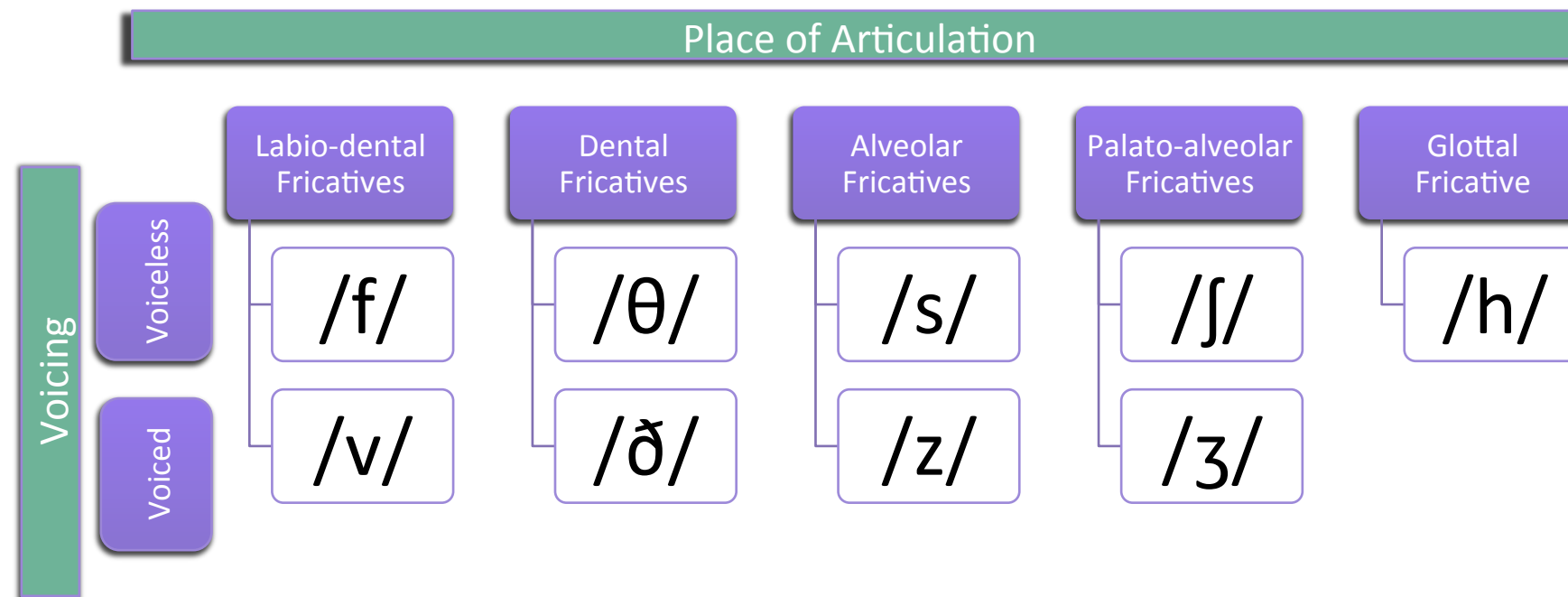
Plosives

Complete closure in the vocal tract, followed by a sudden release of air.



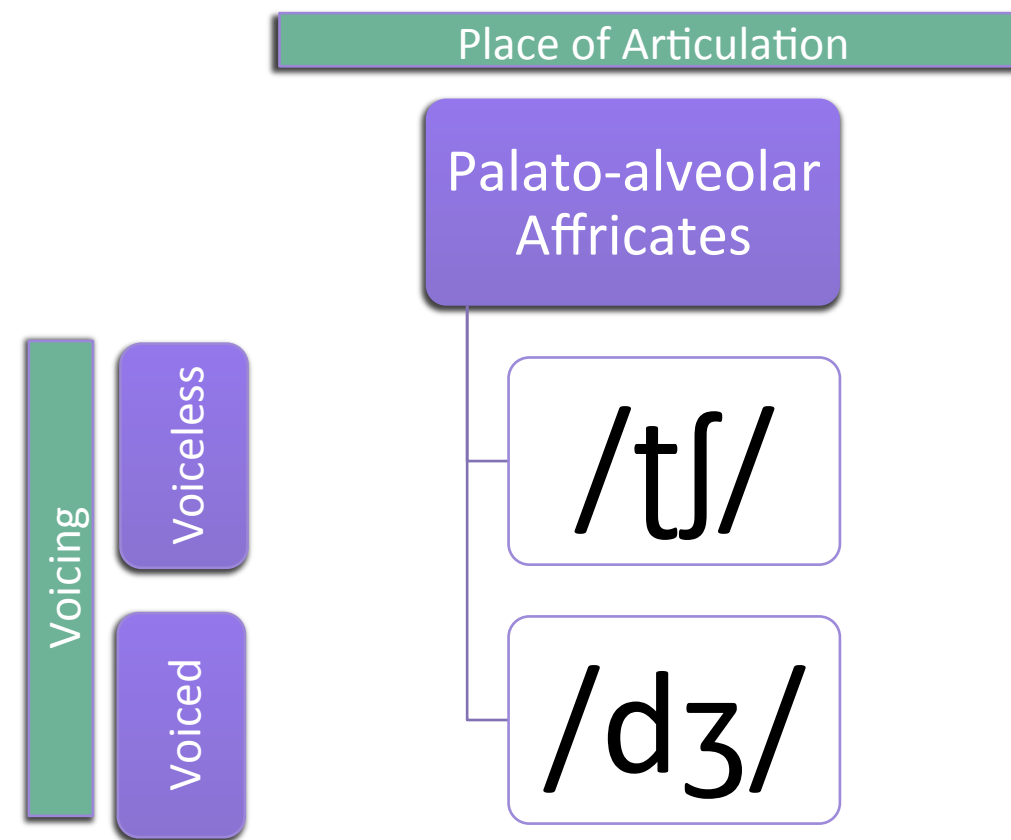
Fricatives

The air passing through a very narrow passage making a hissing sound.



Affricates

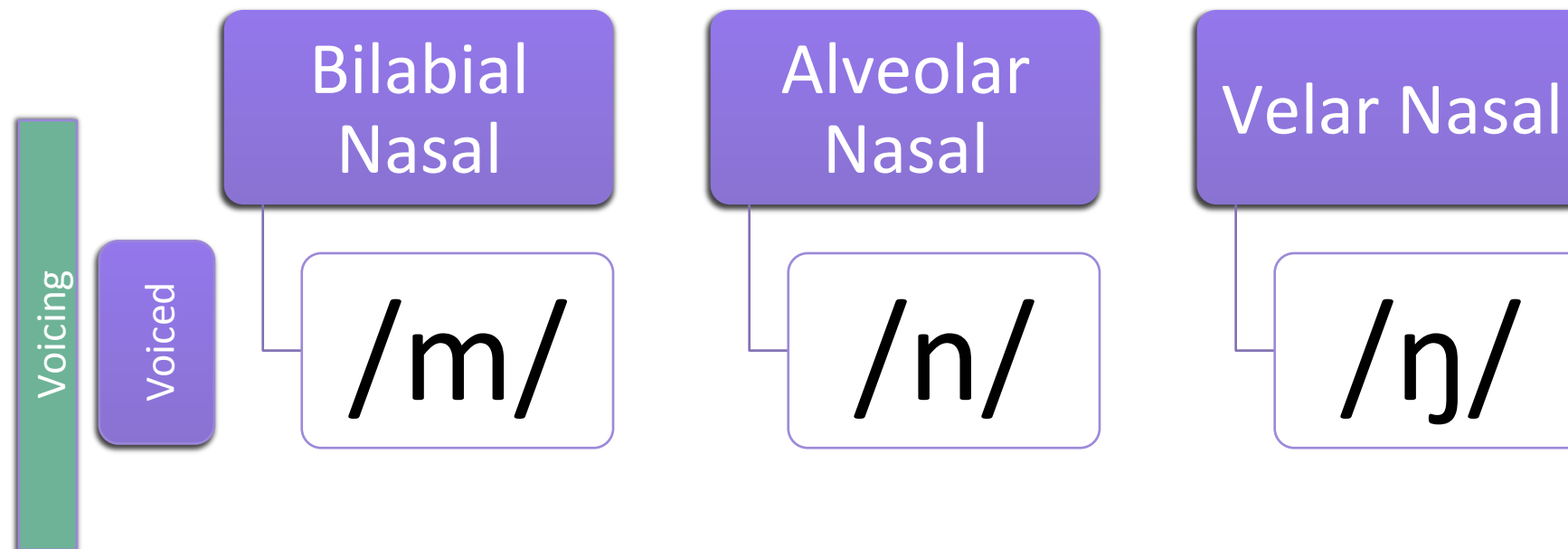
Begin as plosives and end as fricatives



Nasals

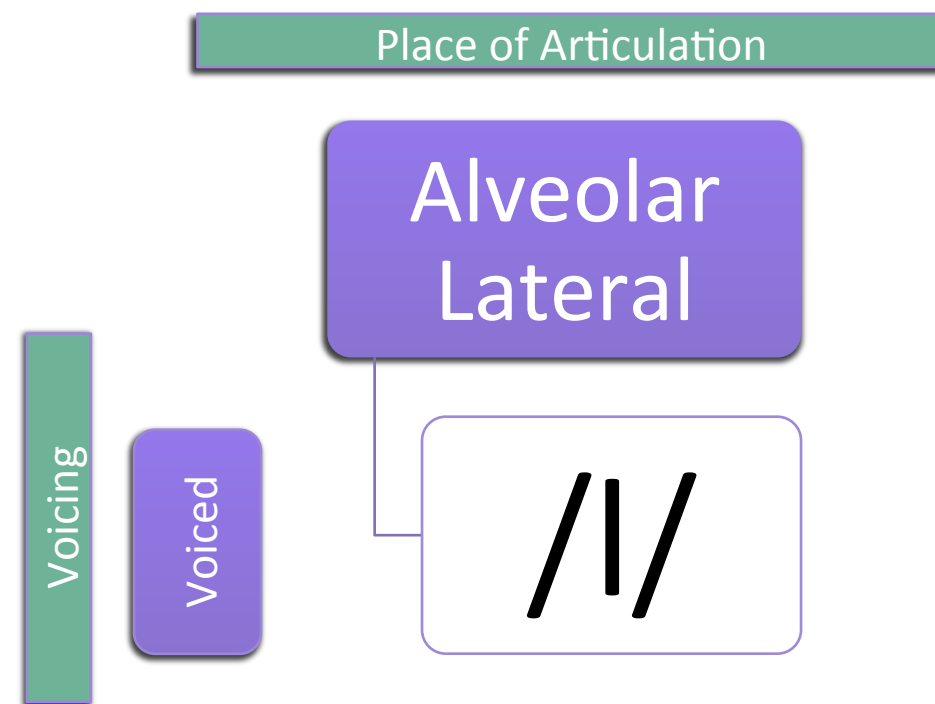
Produces with the soft palate lowered to allow the air to pass through the nose

Place of Articulation



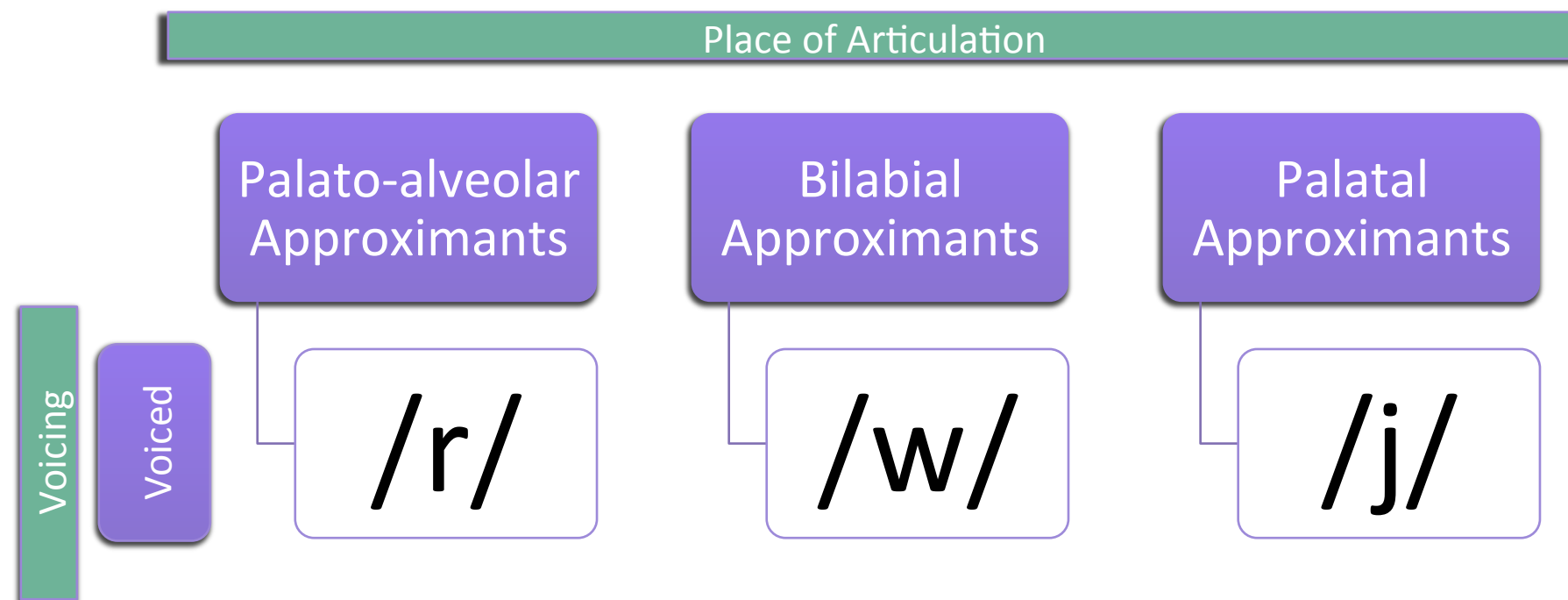
Laterals

A complete closure between the front of the tongue and some part of the hard palate and the air escaping along the sides of the tongue



Approximants

The articulators approaching each other but not close enough to produce a closure or friction so the air escapes freely through the gap between the articulators.
